2019 was a year of great progress and profound sadness at Access Living. We continued our unwavering efforts to improve the lives of people with disabilities through our consumer services, our growing policy agenda and our legal work to protect and promote disability rights. But, sadly, we also lost our founding President and CEO, Marca Bristo, to cancer. She was a guiding force for our organization and the entire disability community, and we miss her daily.

There is no better way to honor Marca than to continue and build upon her life's work. We assured her we would. In 2020, Access Living will celebrate its 40th anniversary. Throughout the year we are planning many events and activities celebrating Marca's life and our anniversary. Thus, we felt that this year's annual report should both document our latest work and showcase the work that came before it, which makes up the fabric of who we are.

Access Living was created 10 years before the Americans with Disabilities Act was passed, at a time when many people with disabilities could not even dream of civil rights legislation. Access Living was one of the first Centers of Independent Living in the country, providing critical services for disabled Chicagoans to live independently, and working to break down systemic barriers to create a stronger more inclusive world. That's a vision we need to keep top of mind more than ever in these polarizing times. Our experience tells us it's not out of reach. We've laid a strong foundation for the work we do today and the work we'll do tomorrow. Our legacy of impact is just beginning.

We make sure that we have seats at tables where decisions regarding issues affecting the lives of persons with disabilities are made.

To that end, Access Living participated on the transition teams for Chicago Mayor Lori Lightfoot and Illinois Governor J.B. Pritzker in 2019, while still holding the city and state accountable for its responsibilities to people with disabilities. We need more accessible affordable housing, equal access to rideshare services, and appropriate funding for personal assistants. We continued to hold Chicago Public Schools accountable for meeting the needs of students with disabilities, while also expanding our youth empowerment, teaching high schoolers with disabilities life skills and disability history. We continued to move people out of nursing homes into their own homes, and expanded our work in the areas of racial justice and immigration.

All of that is a taste of the work we did this year. More details are in the pages that follow. The success that we had this year was not possible without the generous support of our community, the tireless, devoted efforts of our immensely talented staff, the unwavering support of our Board of Directors, and the courage and voice of the consumers we proudly serve. While we need to reflect upon our past accomplishments, we have our sights aimed at the future both near and far. There is so much work we need to accomplish. We look forward to your continued generosity, efforts and support as we continue to challenge stereotypes, offer services and defend disability rights for the next 40 years and beyond.

Bringing Disability to the Forefront

As the president of the Ford Foundation, I have the great privilege of meeting with visionary leaders who are on the front lines of social change. It is in this role that I came to know Access Living and to admire, adore and revere its founding President and CEO Marca Bristo. I knew her as an advocate and an activist, but also as my teacher, as my mentor and as my friend.

A few years ago, a number of people reached out to me in response to a well-publicized letter I wrote on the Ford Foundation's new-found focus on inequality. For all the Foundation was doing to fight inequality in its many forms, we failed to address how our work would disrupt the stark inequities that face people with disabilities.

It was clear that I needed an education on disability. And everyone I talked to said the person who would educate me was Marca Bristo. So I found this brilliant, dazzling, badass woman in Chicago and made my way as soon as I could to her doorstep. And very quickly, Marca Bristo taught me, and taught all of us at the Ford Foundation, about the history and the experience of people with disabilities.

She showed us the ways injustice, bias and prejudice impact people with disabilities, and how the Ford Foundation, if we were to be true to our mission of fighting inequality in the world, had to understand the fight and the potential of people with disabilities.

She reminded us that not only must we change policies and laws, it was also important to change hearts and minds. This is the type of work that Access Living knows well, and Marca helped bring transformative change to our institution. So much so that when it was time to elect a new trustee to the Ford Foundation Board, we were thrilled at the prospect of working side by side with Marca.

We were devastated when Marca called with the news that things did not look good for her. She was positive and hopeful even in delivering tragic news.

Marca spent her life fighting to ensure that people with disabilities had a seat at the table, and she lived by the maxim "nothing about us without us." On behalf of everyone at the Ford Foundation, I know she will always have a place in our boardroom and in our hearts. I am so grateful for her influence, her humanity, her humility and her hope.

I see so much of her in the army of people she worked with at Access Living. Her spirit and vision lives on in them. And I have no doubt that together, we can make the world a better place for people with disabilities.

Remembering Access Living's Founding CEO Marca Bristo

Access Living's founding CEO and internationally renowned disability rights leader Marca Bristo passed away on September 8, 2019 from cancer.

Paralyzed from the chest down in a diving accident at age 23, Marca became a staunch disability activist early in life and was named CEO of Access Living just two years after her accident.

Advocates from all fields recognized Marca's powerful – and sometimes deliberately controversial – tactics. To work with Marca was to be part of a never-ending conversation about disability. 24/7, 365 days a year, she guided and mentored us.

That's why almost 40 years after Marca took the helm at Access Living, we continue to be a highly influential voice in the fight for equity and inclusion of people with disabilities.

Marca was beloved in Chicago, not only for her ability to cement longstanding relationships, but because she saw opportunities that opened doors for people with disabilities. She was not a leader for just one community, but in solidarity with all. Because of Marca, Access Living is a place for people who wish to serve others and who are ready to challenge the status quo.

Marca did that herself and her advocacy never stopped. One of her crowning achievements was helping to author the Americans with Disabilities Act, the landmark legislation that granted people with disabilities civil rights, which was signed into law in 1990. Her efforts led to accessible buses in Chicago, the first fair housing program in the country to address disability discrimination, the inclusion of disability issues in domestic violence law, and the requirement for all televisions to have close-captioned decoders.

When asked about her advocacy work in a 2008 interview with *Chicago Magazine* she said, "That's part of the disability experience: taking risks and having a tenacious sense of can-do-itness. The things we've been advocating are not just for a marginal group of people; they're for the society as a whole. Disability affects all of us. It's time that we normalize and accept it rather than perceive it to be at the margins of our society."

Marca, we miss you. We know you're still with us as we lead on. We aim to be champions of change and to lead from power as you did. Thank you for showing us how. We are forever grateful.


In 2019, we provided services to 1,834 people.

Our Services

Access Living offers services and support for people with disabilities in Chicago. This year, with Access Living's support:

- 253 people with disabilities worked with us to learn how to live independently. 89% of participants in this program said they learned useful information about managing finances and the benefits available for people with disabilities.
- We connected more than 230 disabled people in Chicago to services, supports and adaptive technology that they needed to be more independent.
- We transitioned

 53 people out of nursing facilities and into home and community-based settings.
- More than **250** people attended classes on affordable housing.
- More than **170** young people with disabilities worked with us to transition from high school to higher education or employment through our Fast Track and Pre-Employment Transition Services programs.
 - I really enjoyed the class. The topics and materials were very informative.

 I feel capable and comfortable with managing my personal finances. I would recommend this class to others because there is a lot of information that people don't know about.
- More than **40** young people with disabilities were mentored by others with disabilities or gained employment through our programming.
- Provided **346** consumers with individualized support in hiring Personal Assistants.
- 57 people took our money management classes and 85% of them have improved their financial position.

Defending Our Rights

Access Living does community organizing, policy work and legal work around issues that are important to people with disabilities in Chicago, Illinois and nationwide. We speak up to make sure the rights of people with disabilities are respected and that our voices are heard. We fight against disability-related discrimination. In 2019:

- Our staff and board members participated in transition subcommittee work for both Governor Pritzker and Mayor Lightfoot. For the Governor, we were part of the civil rights and healthcare subcommittees, and for the Mayor, we were part of the housing and transportation subcommittees.
- Our advocacy staff visited with 35 state and city level elected officials to build relationships and educate our representatives on what Access Living does and what our community cares about.
- We joined other advocates in leading policy work around assistance animals in housing after learning the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) plans to modify its existing guidance. We remain concerned HUD will issue new guidance that makes it more difficult for disabled people to assert their right to have assistance animals in housing.

Education

- We released our twelfth annual review of the Chicago Public Schools (CPS) budget for FY 2019 citing special education staffing shortages and recommending strategic reconsideration of how CPS will resolve issues affecting students with disabilities.
- As one of the leaders of the Chicago Special Education Advocates Group, we began collaborating with the Illinois State Board of Education and its newly appointed monitor in order to reform CPS's special education program.
- We celebrated a newly enacted education law this spring that our staff wrote and that we vigorously advocated for. It initially provided parents of students with disabilities in CPS with a draft of Individual Education Plan (IEP) documents five days in advance of IEP meetings so that parents have a chance to review them and to contribute to the IEP in a meaningful way. We then advocated for a special education bill extending the scope statewide so all Illinois families of students with disabilities would receive the benefit of having sufficient information three days before the IEP meeting.

Healthcare

- The Healthcare and Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) policy and organizing staff conducted a wildly successful town hall on sexuality that explored disability, sexual identity, sexual pleasure and agency in an affirming way.
- They also worked to support the right to sex and reproductive health education for people with intellectual/developmental disabilities through a state bill, HB 3299.
- Access Living hosted its second Queer X Disability Resource Fair.



Housing

- We filed a federal lawsuit against the City of Chicago for not having accessible homeless shelters and for turning people away because they have a disability.
- We continued our federal lawsuit against the City of Chicago over its failure to make its affordable housing program accessible to people with disabilities.
- Along with Neighbors for Affordable
 Housing and the Chicago Housing Initiative,
 Access Living's Disability Rights Action
 Coalition for Housing (DRACH) organizing
 group successfully pushed through a new
 accessible and affordable housing project
 in Jefferson Park.
- We continued to call for updates to Chicago's building code with the goal of making it the most accessible in the nation.
- We continued to give legal assistance to a family that wants to modify their historic home in Old Town for their daughter who uses a wheelchair. A group of neighbors claim modifying the family's home will compromise the historical nature of the neighborhood. We intervened in the case to protect the family's right to make the home accessible.



Transportation

- We continued our lawsuit against Uber.
- We participated in former Mayor Rahm Emanuel's Taskforce for New Mobility, which presented its findings in early 2019. Access Living recommended policies

to ensure the disability community has meaningful access to shared mobility devices as they are developed and brought online.

Intersectional Justice

- We have done more work on racial justice
 this year. We are working to change options
 for emergency response involving black
 and brown people with disabilities. To help
 address that, our Advancing Your Leadership
 Power (AYLP) organizing group hosted
 three town halls, including one where the
 Office of Emergency Management and
 Communications presented. Emergency
 response alternatives were explored and
 attendees learned about the current processes.
- We advocated on the rights of immigrants with disabilities. We worked on bills to make sure immigrants with disabilities in Illinois can access services they need, including a bill to protect immigrant tenants' rights. We also submitted public comments on the federal public charge rule change facing some immigrants with disabilities. Along with the National Immigrant Justice Center, we organized an Immigration and Disability Summit focused on Chicagoland advocates from both the immigration and disability sectors, establishing an action plan and a brand new Task Force to address issues facing immigrants with disabilities.

Our Arts and Culture

The Access Living's Arts and Culture Project promotes innovative art and disability culture, increases public access to disability arts and culture, and gives voice to artists with disabilities. It also curates a permanent art collection by artists with disabilities at Access Living's headquarters, and hosts a series of lectures, music, art, poetry and spoken word programs each year. In 2019, Access Living sponsored and co-sponsored 18 events attended by more than 1,400 people.
