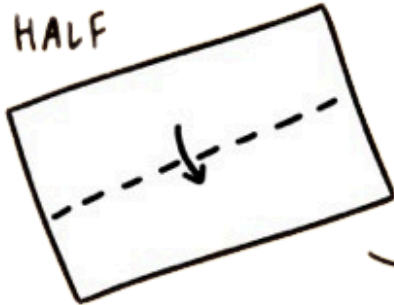


HOW TO MAKE A ZINE

1. FOLD IN HALF



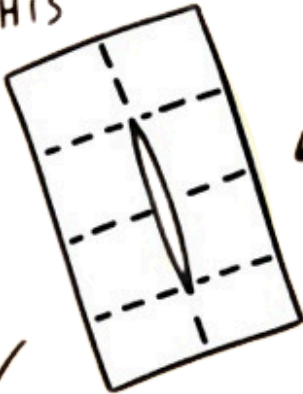
2. FOLD IN HALF (AGAIN)



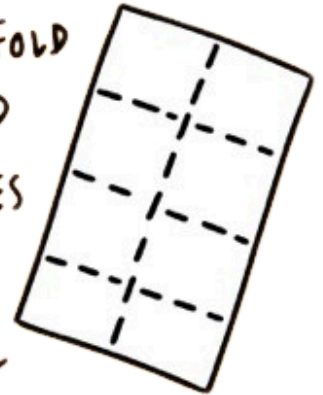
3. FOLD IN HALF (AGAIN)



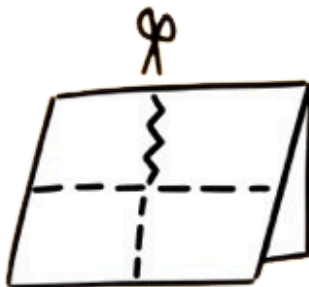
6 UNFOLDED, IT SHOULD LOOK LIKE (THIS



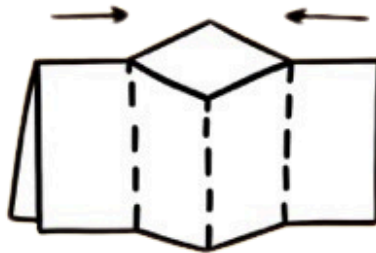
4. UNFOLD TO FIND 8 PAGES

AS AN IMMIGRANT WITH A DISABILITY

YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO REMAIN SILENT

You don't have to answer questions that could incriminate you. Say clearly: "I choose to remain silent."

SPEAK TO A LAWYER

In immigration cases, you must hire one. In criminal cases, you'll be provided one if you can't afford it. Say: "I want to speak with a lawyer."

NOT TO SIGN ANYTHING

Never sign papers without your attorney present.

AS AN IMMIGRANT WITH A DISABILITY

WHAT COUNTS AS A DISABILITY UNDER THE ADA:

A DISABILITY IS A PHYSICAL OR MENTAL IMPAIRMENT THAT LIMITS MAJOR LIFE ACTIVITIES, OR A RECORD OR PERCEPTION OF SUCH AN IMPAIRMENT.

EXAMPLES INCLUDE:

- Mobility or sensory disabilities
- Mental health conditions
- Chronic illnesses
- Communication or learning disabilities

I Am a Person With a Disability

I am a person with a disability. I require accommodations to engage with you. You are required to provide me with these accommodations under the Americans with Disabilities Act and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act.

- I have the right to remain silent and to speak with a lawyer before signing anything.
- I do not consent to any search of my belongings under the 4th Amendment.
- Please speak calmly and clearly, and allow time for me to process instructions.

LAWS THAT PROTECT YOU

AS AN IMMIGRANT WITH A DISABILITY

- **ADA TITLE II – STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTS (INCLUDING POLICE, COURTS, AND DETENTION CENTERS) MUST NOT DISCRIMINATE.**
- **SECTION 504 – FEDERAL AGENCIES (ICE, DHS, DOJ, ETC.) AND FEDERALLY FUNDED PROGRAMS MUST ENSURE EQUAL ACCESS.**
- **You have the right to be treated with dignity, safety, and equal access during all encounters.**

AS AN IMMIGRANT WITH A DISABILITY

A REASONABLE ACCOMMODATION IS A CHANGE IN POLICY OR PRACTICE SO YOU CAN PARTICIPATE EQUALLY.

Examples:

- Interpreter (ASL or spoken language)
- Access to medication or medical devices in detention
- Extra time or simplified communication in hearings
- Adjusted restraints or mobility assistance

Officials can only deny requests if they cause “undue burden,” and that’s rare.

AS AN IMMIGRANT WITH A DISABILITY

YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO A REASONABLE ACCOMMODATION DURING QUESTIONING, HEARINGS, OR DETENTION

Examples:

- Sign-language or spoken-language interpreters
- Captioning, Braille, or large print
- AAC device or personal communication tools
- Calm, clear, and slow speech
- Enough time to process and respond

Officials must give “primary consideration” to your communication request — and cannot charge you.
